The Importance of Governance

The Far North REAP Board of Directors is responsible for the general oversight of the Organisation.

David in turn has the responsibility of staffing the organisation and ensuring that the policies, procedures and rules are complied with. He is also responsible for negotiating contracts which will result in the objects of the organisation being met. The Board currently consists of Joanne Murray; Deputy Chairperson, Shirley Neho, Craig Hobson, and Roger Gale who are all members of the Society of Far North REAP. Raewyn Flay is a Director appointed from outside the Society as is Joanne Bentley. I am Chairperson and I am a founding Member of the Society. Those Directors bring a wide range of skills, qualifications, experience and networks. Two of those members, Shirley and Roger are on our major sub-committee, the Audit and Risk Committee with an external member, accountant Greg Steed and David. Shirley will be representing our Board at the Annual gathering of

REAPs in Wellington in May while David will be there with some of his staff.

I will not be seeking re-election at our Annual Meeting which is probably happening in June. I will be available in a consultancy role if needed but I do not anticipate being called on.

This will be my last Quarterly report as Board Chairperson.

Statement from Kahika | Mayor Moko Tepania



Kia ora e te whānau o Te Hiku o te Ika, It's an honour to be asked to contribute to our Far North Community Magazine.

I know that you all in Te Hiku have been doing it tough. Please know that your mayor, councillors and community board members are here for you and will always be working hard on your behalf, kia kaha tonu!

Far North REAP undertakes fantastic mahi across our district and is a huge asset for the Far North, making a real difference to people of all ages every day, ngā mihi nui!

The last Quarterly magazine focused strongly on road safety with the REAP Road Safety Team delivering impressive programmes across the rohe targeted at all road users. Understandably, the ongoing closure of State Highway 1 at Mangamuka Gorge featured as a significant problem. This is also a huge concern for the council. The closure of this vital road link for Te Hiku is seriously impacting residents, the local

economy and the rest of our roading network as traffic is forced onto alternative roads not built to carry the traffic volumes they now are. We've repeatedly called on central government to address this and other roading problems to make sure our communities are not forgotten. The good news is that we now have a confirmed timeline for Mangamuka Gorge to reopen. Waka Kotahi announced at the end of March that it aims to repair the 15 slips that closed this link last August and hopes to reopen the highway by May 2024. The repairs will cost \$100 million. While this is still over a year away, I'm grateful that Waka Kotahi has committed funding and now, a timeline that we can all plan around. For the 20.000 residents of Te Hiku the closure of SH1 at Mangamuka is all too familiar. The road was open for less than a year following a similar year-long closure due to massive slips. I know that many were forced to make hard employment and business decisions. I am continually impressed by the resilience shown by residents and the business community. This time, I want to see the economically important real Far North get the support it needs and deserves.



We will be lobbying hard for the government to consider alternative transport strategies for Te Hiku and the whole district. As a council we will continue to push that transport inequities faced by whānau in remote areas are addressed and want

dedicated rural funding so we aren't competing with our metropolitan neighbours further afield for a decent slice of the pie. We will also push for changes so that our critical roading networks across the Far North provide safe, resilient and well-maintained links that are a necessity for our communities.

Ngā Purapura Family Festival

Far North REAP were excited to join with Ngā Purapura Family Festival in Kaeo on Saturday 4th March 2023 to support a great community day out. Our Education Team created an inviting 'clay play' space with natural items like leaves, flowers, shells and stones for children and their whānau to enjoy with the clay. Children learn through play – where they can explore, experiment, discover and solve problems in imaginative and playful ways.

Clay provides children with many opportunities to learn through play to discover and develop different ways to be creative and expressive. Clay can be rolled, squeezed, cut and pinched into different shapes and its texture can be changed by adding water. Clay can be reused and recycled when it is dry or used

to create long-lasting items. Clay helps children to develop hand/ eye coordination, develop fine motor skills, to be creative, play alongside others, experience making 3-dimensional objects, express feelings and ideas and explore all their senses and the use of tools, materials and equipment to extend their skills.



This is a FREE programme that aims to support whānau of 3 - 5 year old children/tamariki engaging in an Early Learning Service | Kōhanga Reo or Pre-school for the first time. The aim is to ensure all children/tamariki have access to high quality early learning by having support, overcoming barriers and where they can develop a strong educational foundation in preparation for starting school/kura. The last project which is a milestone for the contract we have with Kanoa (MBIE) is to deliver the Town Square. This refers to the "old pak'n save carpark". You may have seen the Northland Age frontpage article in February advertising public meetings to show the community the plans and get feedback.

Originally, prior to consultation, part of the concrete block walls decorated with the mosaic tiles made by approximately 500 members of the community was going to stay. However, after the consultation period the majority view was to remove the full length of the block walls as it acts as a barrier and the idea of this town square is for a people space to enjoy. The other main reason to remove the old block walls completely is that we will retain more carparks and carparking is an issue for the majority of people who came to view the plans.

The large trees are also causing issues with roots pushing through the walls and the debri blocking spouting

we need a new

steel waka sculpture 9m long with a totara warrior sitting in the centre will be the focal point of this town square. If the budget allows 3 water jets on each side will be installed and the back fence will be in a wave shape giving the impression of the sea/river/awa behind the waka that will be 3 metres high off the ground. Bollards will be installed on the road side as vehicles will no longer be able to access the parking via Commerce Street. The parking behind the town square will be accessible from West Lane,

access through the wooden fence that is the back boundary of the Town Square. The Town Square



will take up about 1/3 of the current carpark so we still retain the majority of parking and there will be several places through the fence for people to walk through to access the shops, café, banks that they need. Food trucks will be on one side with outdoor furniture allowing people to gather to enjoy takeaway or lunch from home in an outdoor space. The trees will be replaced in large concrete pots so that there is greenery around too, as well as a section of artificial grass over top of the middle section of the space to take away the concrete carpark look. Jen Gay who co-ordinated the mosaic tiles is very passionate about this large piece of community art and when I let her know that the walls were going, she asked us if we could appeal one more time to the community to ensure that is what they want. The children who made the tiles are now adults in our community; there is connection and in some cases, emotion attached to each tile.

If people want to retain the mosaic tiles, Jen has offered to carefully remove as many tiles as possible and either return them to those who made them or we can repurpose them in the garden spaces at our local parks for more people to enjoy.
